The National Curriculum for music as well as the recently published Model Music Curriculum aims to ensure that every student has access to the four key areas of learning – Sing & Chant - Listen & Appraise, Learn & Perform and Create & Compose, within the Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS), Key Stage 1 and 2.

This document has been designed to give Primary schools an overview of all provision available to them through Music Education Islington (MEI), which meet these four curriculum areas.

The provision outlined includes both in and after school provision, as well as out of school activities for teachers to recommend to their students. A list of external organisations are included under each curriculum activity, where available. Musical Environment for EYFS & KS1

A creative musical environment is essential for children to explore sounds, genres & styles.

Children are given access to instruments such as shakers, glockenspiels and drums. Music making is encouraged to develop listening and verbal skills. Musical communication skills are further explored through the encouragement of improvisation & compositional activities, which includes moving and clapping to music and sounds.

Children are encouraged to listen to a wide range of music that encompasses different styles, cultures, genres and time periods. Musical environments can be created following Nicola Burke's publication: <u>Musical Development Matters ONLINE.pdf (early-</u> education.org.uk)

Singing Assemblies for EYFS, KS1 and KS2

Singing in assemblies is a great way to bring a school together – students and teachers alike - and promote and maintain a strong singing culture. Repertoire should reflect the developmental stage of the year group, as well as the cultures and interests of the children in your school.

This opportunity for music making integrates everyone at the school through singing, using sign language and moving.

Jolly Music for EYFS and KS1

The Jolly Music scheme offers a well-planned music curriculum, teaching musical skills to children through singing, games and rhymes. The approach places singing at the very heart, engaging inner hearing and developing musical ability, with the outlook that the voice is the ideal instrument, because we all have one and it is free!

Through fun games and activities, children are engaged with active music-making and build a broad range of skills that are built upon and reinforced through building blocks. These skills develop a child's emotions, creativity and academic thinking. Moreover, this musical grounding will prepare them for their future musical journeys and enhance learning in other subjects.

Delivery: The Jolly Music Handbook is intended for primary school class teachers, with little or no musical training, to use in a whole class setting. By singing regularly in class, teachers will also develop confidence using their own voices.

Cross-curricular activities for KS1 and KS2

In order to allow children and students to experience a rich and varied music curriculum, music is best integrated into the whole school curriculum.

This can be achieved through:

- Creative writing inspired by music
- Sciences: exploring sound and acoustics through making own instruments
- Exploring music from different times & places (history, term topics, seasonal material)

Whole Class Ensemble Teaching (WCET) for KS1 and KS2

Every child has the right to learn an instrument, ideally for at least one year.

The ideal time to start your WCET programme is in years 2, 3 or 4. Instrument suitability depends on the age of the year group, teaching ability and confidence and/or budget. Instruments such as the glockenspiel, recorder, fife, ukulele, percussion, violin, viola, and cello are recommended for ensemble teaching. All instruments have a good potential for developing progression routes for children.

- Voice Progression for KS2Children should be given the opportunity to use their voices
- in different ways, including rhyming, spoken word, rapping, or opera. MEI voice progression projects can be run in the school term time alongside instrumental progression [hyperlink] and music technology progression (hyperlink) opportunities.
- School Choirs for different age groups as well as staff members are a good opportunity for children and adults alike to explore the use of their voice.

Instrumental Progression for KS2

Instrumental progression gives children and young people an opportunity to develop their skills and abilities during regular school hours, at an after school club or through MEI Music Centres.

Instrumental progression can include:

- instruments children have learned through Whole Class Ensemble Teaching
- move on to a related instrument (e.g. recorder → clarinet, fife → flute)
- or a contrasting instrument (recorder → drumming)
- school ensemble: mix of instruments, children performing existing material or creating their own pieces, exploring different styles & genres

These projects can also be run as a term activity and linked up with progression opportunities for voice and music technology

Music Technology Progression for KS2

Using technology as a progression tool gives students an additional avenue to explore and engage with music. From simple activities such as 'Making up music' supported by Charanga, which encourages children to play simple notes along with a backing track, to tablet software such as GarageBand, to the creation of soundscapes alongside a written story, music technology can be used for a wide variety of in-school activities.

These activities can be run as a term activity and linked up with progression opportunities for voice and instrumental progression.

After school clubs can be individually arranged for your school requirements. Through Music Education Islington's recommended teachers, activities and clubs can be delivered as follows: :

	Music Therapy for EYFS, KS1 and KS2	
	Music therapy is a psychological intervention using interactive music making as a form of communication and self-expression to bring about positive change in peoples' lives.	
	Music Therapists can engage and support children and adults of all ages to help with a range of psychological, emotional, social, physiological or behavioural needs. Therapists have specialist training and experience in mental health and learning difficulties, as well as knowledge and expertise to make recommendations for further support where needed.	
	Central to music therapy is the trusting relationship with the therapist, which is established and developed on a weekly basis, through live interaction and musical play. Sessions are delivered through 1:1 engagement, or in groups.	
	People do not need to have musical training or skills to benefit from sessions, and music therapists are trained to find the best way to engage with each person. Music therapy involves improvising, composition, singing and playing music and is used to help children create a personal language, through which they can explore their inner thoughts and feelings, and communicate and engage with others.	
	 Examples of reasons for referral include (but are not limited to): Enhance parent-child bonding and relationship; Develop trust and positive relationship; Increase self-expression, confidence and communication; Improve social interaction and reduce isolation; Encourage emotional literacy and expression; Improve concentration and attention span; Improve motor planning and coordination; 	
	 What are the benefits? Improvement in self-esteem and self-confidence; Improvements in social interaction and communication skills; Developments in emotional expression; Improved attention and focus, and capacity to self-regulate
