## Module Outline

This module supports your transition into higher education, helping you develop as a learner, artist, and future professional. You will build core skills such as communication, adaptability, self-awareness, and resilience, while also fostering teamwork and professional standards. You will take part in two collaborative projects: the Cross-School Project, which develops ensemble and team-based skills, and the Installation Project, a student-led performance-making project. Together, these experiences provide a foundation for your long-term personal, creative, and professional growth.

The module is taught primarily via seminars, lectures and supervised project work. You will receive regular verbal feedback from tutors throughout the module to help you monitor your progress and refine your work. After each block of teaching and assessment, you will also receive written feedback that reflects on your performance in relation to the assessment criteria and outlines strategies for development in future tasks.

- Work effectively and respectfully as part of a collaborative team, demonstrating growing confidence, responsibility, and awareness of group processes in diverse contexts.
- Identify and use established research and presentation techniques to structure and communicate ideas clearly and reliably, using appropriate terminology.

### Module Outline

In this module you will attend up to eight live performances or related events, ranging from theatre productions to exhibitions and immersive experiences. These are chosen to expose you to diverse creative practices and broaden your understanding of performance and production.

Following each event, you will take part in seminars to reflect, discuss, and develop your critical awareness as both an observer and practitioner. You will also maintain a Performance Journal to document your responses, which will form the basis of your final assessed piece, Response to Performance.

Alongside this, Critical Lens seminars will introduce you to key frameworks and themes, helping you analyse live work and situate your own creative practice within contemporary cultural and societal contexts.

The module is taught primarily via seminars, lectures and field trips.

You will receive regular verbal feedback from tutors throughout the module to help you monitor your progress and refine your work. After each block of teaching and assessment, you will also receive written feedback that reflects on your performance in relation to the assessment criteria and outlines strategies for development in future tasks.

Upon successful completion of this module, you will be able to:

- Identify and describe the performing arts within a range of cultural, historical, and social contexts, demonstrating knowledge of underlying concepts and principles in the discipline.
- Begin to analyse and discuss contemporary developments in the performing arts, making connections to key themes and wider cultural perspectives with awareness of the limits of your knowledge.
- Demonstrate an introductory understanding of research methodologies and apply them to explore and inform emerging critical debates in the performing arts.

## Module Outline

This module introduces you to the wider production process and the collaborative nature of theatre-making. Through practical workshops and demonstrations, you will develop core technical and safety skills, including manual handling, working at height, safe use of tools, and theatre-specific protocols.

You will gain an understanding of theatre spaces, stage configurations, and industry-standard terminology, supporting effective communication and safe working practices across departments. The module also introduces you to the role of the Production Manager, covering responsibilities such as scheduling, budgeting, risk assessment, and health and safety compliance.

In addition, you will explore sustainability in theatre, engaging with the Theatre Green Book framework to consider environmentally responsible practices.

The module is taught primarily via seminars, lectures and supervised practical activity.

You will receive regular verbal feedback from tutors throughout the module to help you monitor your progress and refine your work. After each block of teaching and assessment, you will also receive written feedback that reflects on your performance in relation to the assessment criteria and outlines strategies for development in future tasks.

Upon successful completion of this module, you will be able to:

- Identify and apply appropriate health and safety practices to work safely, responsibly, and competently within theatre production environments, demonstrating awareness of professional standards.
- Describe the key elements of the production process and explain their interconnections, showing an understanding of how they support the planning and delivery of live performance.
- Demonstrate foundational knowledge of theatre buildings, staging configurations, and stagecraft, applying appropriate terminology to describe, interpret, and participate in production processes.
- Recognise sustainability and ethical responsibilities in theatre production, identifying environmentally conscious approaches and reflecting on the social, cultural, and material impact of creative and technical decisions.
